FROM the Co-PRESIDENT

We are instructed to welcome the stranger 36 times in the Torah. Our community at East End Temple takes this instruction to heart, welcoming all who enter our doors. We aim to be a warm and welcoming presence to each concentric circle of community: our members; those who are seeking a spiritual home in New York; and our broader New York community.



How do we do this?

For new and prospective members: Through our new Voluntary Dues Pilot model, we are hoping to lift any financial barriers to membership. New members have noted that they had never joined a congregation before because of the dues barrier, and were thrilled to hear that the barrier had been lifted when they learned about our voluntary dues – the only such model in New York City Jewish congregations.

Our goal is to ensure that members feel part of the community from the moment they consider joining. Each new and prospective member is invited to meet with the clergy or a lay leader to connect on a personal level with our community. And the opportunity for personal connections among members continues beyond that initial meeting. Our new corps of ambassadors connect individually with new members, attend services and programs together, and meet outside of East End Temple to make sure that new members always feel included in our community.

For current members: All members of the congregation should feel connected with our community. In addition to our diverse programs and cohorts, including Pick-Me-Up gatherings for religious school parents once a month, weekly family Shabbat programming, Sisterhood and Men's Club, Chesed, ushering, and Shira with Shira (to name just a few!), we are planning opportunities for connection among the entire congregation this year. In particular, this winter, each member will be invited to the home of an East End Temple member for Shabbat dinner to meet over challah, good food, and warm company. We hope everyone will attend a dinner.

For our broader community: Our work with Córdoba House, including opening our space to their religious school and joint Interfaith programming such as our Interfaith Seder, Thanksgiving, and Simchat Shabbat, has developed into a special partnership. In addition, through our social justice work, members help to provide sanctuary for immigrants throughout our community. More locally, with Food for Families, East End Temple members feed thousands of hungry New Yorkers.

I hope you will join in these opportunities throughout the year, so that you connect. If there are other ways that we can make you feel more included, please let us know.

Simultaneously, my challenge to you is this: how will you welcome those into our community?



am worried about anti-Semitism and I know you are too. I think about it constantly – how to combat it, how to eradicate it, why it exists in the first place. How to best educate our children, effect change on a local, national, and global level, how to remain safe in an ever more hostile landscape.



Education is the surest way to fight ignorance and ignorance is the surest way to grow the hatred and fear that feeds the fires of anti-Semitism coming from all sides, the left, right and the middle. Where it once hid in the shadows it is now marching proudly in our neighborhoods, in our children's schools, in our government. Always vicious, it is once again growing increasingly violent as anti-Semitic attacks are reportedly on the rise. According to the ADL, in 2018 and 2019, there were 4,916 incidents of extremism or anti-Semitism in the United States, and the numbers continue to grow. I am thrilled that we are joining with the ADL's 'One Year After Pittsburgh: Remembering our Past Fighting for our Future' and a special combatting anti-Semitism program for our teens, and we must continue to do more.

any of you know that I volunteer with 3rd Generation Holocaust Survivors teaching about the Holocaust in public and private classrooms in NYC through the stories of my grandparents' harrowing and heroic survival as partisans. I also serve on the 3G board of the Jewish Partisan Educational Foundation, a phenomenal organization whose mission is to develop and distribute educational materials, bringing the celebration of heroic resistance against tyranny into educational and cultural organizations. The source material provided by JPEF enables me to truly bring my grandparents' stories to life in every classroom I visit.

I am humbled that I have been chosen to receive an honor at this year's JPEF gala for my commitment to perpetuating the legacies of my grandparents and others through education in and out of the classrooms as cantor, educator and creator of Bubby's Kitchen. TWO COMPELLING BRUNCH **EVENTS IN NOVEMBER**

The Increasing Balance of Women in Politics. What has happened to the gender balance in American politics and why?



Women entered the political scene in 1894, with the election of three Colorado women to the House of Representatives. Until recently, the increase in the numbers of women elected to political positions has been slow. Today women are being elected in record numbers. Since 2010, we have seen a 53% increase in the numbers of women in Congress, a 16% increase in state legislatures and a 26% increase in New York State. Women's voices are being heard.

Panel Discussion - "Local Women, Local Politics."

On Sunday, November 17, from 10:30am to 12:30pm, four local women politicians will share their stories, moderated by our Assemblyman and EET member, Harvey Epstein:

- Assemblymember Deborah Glick, whose district includes the Village, Tribeca and Battery Park City and is Chair of the Committee on Higher Education.
- State Senator Liz Krueger, representing Midtown and East Side communities and is Chair of the Senate Finance Committee.
- Councilmember Carlina Rivera, whose district includes East End Temple and many of the surrounding neighborhoods.
- State Senator Julia Salazar, who represents a number of neighborhoods in Brooklyn and is Chair of the Committee on Women's Health.

All are welcome to attend and bring guests. A light brunch will be served.

Mindy Sherry, Education Director, Makes the Most of her Jewish Journey

Mindy hails from Miami, Florida and is one of six kids. Her dad is a retired partner from Ernst & Young, and her stepmom, a lawyer and occupational therapist. Raised at the intersection of ritual and personal choice, Mindy's family attended the Orthodox Young Israel of Kendel. Mindy went to its Hebrew Day School.

Mindy is a people helper. She was active in Young Judea, America's Zionist youth movement, and attended its summer camp. While a student of Clinical Social Work at Florida International University, she taught pre-school at the Reform Temple Judea of Coral Gables.

Reform Judaism represented a new beginning. After college graduation in 2003, she was selected as the temple's Assistant Education Director. For the first time in her Jewish journey, she was interpreting Torah through a modern lens and really getting to know her rabbi. Temple Judea's Rabbi Edwin Goldberg supported and mentored Mindy in her spiritual and professional pursuits.

In 2009 Mindy applied for a Hebrew Union College twin Master's program in Jewish Education and Jewish Non-Profit Management. Los Angeles attracted her so she chose and was accepted to the Los Angeles campus. Her study year in Jerusalem was a dream come true.



Mindy also always wanted to live in New York. She became the Director of Youth and Family Engagement at Brooklyn's Union Temple in 2013. On her watch, she grew its Hebrew School from 22 to 80 students.

This year she jumped at the chance to be our new Education Director. Mindy has exciting plans for our kids through b'nei mitzvah and beyond.



ANTI-SEMITISM and A POWERFUL CLIENT

A recent Ethicist column in the Sunday NY Times (9/22/2019) that defended your right to be silent in the face of a prejudicial ethnic slur brought this incident to mind: Foster & Gallagher was a successful mail order catalog firm in Peoria, Illinois years ago. They specialized in inexpensive housewares and gifts and the company was a major advertiser in some mass circulation magazines including mine, Family Circle. We bound supplied minicatalogs into the magazines; it was a very profitable account as we did no printing, just the binding. Also, we could carry this class of advertising since our magazine was single-copy sold, not mailed and not subject to U.S. postal charges.

While it was a schlep and an expense to get to Peoria, their advertising expenditure warranted my trip. The two owners were a clever, diminutive man, Tom Foster – who had an enormous wagon wheel installed high on the wall behind his desk to tell you who he was – and a matronly partner, Helen Gallagher, who was the merchandise maven of the company and the buyer of current trendy items.

During one territory visit, I was accompanied by a junior salesman from my magazine. Traveling from the Foster & Gallagher plant to another destination, junior and I were in the back seat of Foster's car. Tom and Helen were in front, Tom driving. They were discussing a recent illness of Helen's. She rambled on about her problem and then suddenly I heard "...and the kike doctor said..." My head shut down and I didn't hear the rest of the sentence.

We were speeding along the express highway at 50 m.p.h. and I said nothing.

It's now many years after the incident and I still remember that I said nothing at the time. Was I protecting my business? Were my hands really tied? Did I not want a confrontation in a moving car with a powerful, bigoted client? To this day, I regret not handling it differently.

And then I read the case in the recent Times. I still don't feel exonerated.

Potato Latkes for Chanukah

(or for any other time)

- 2 eggs
- 4 cups grated potatoes, drained (see below)
- 4 Tbs. grated onion
- I tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 4 Tbs. matzoh meal
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil

Beat eggs. Add potatoes, onion, salt, pepper, and matzoh meal and stir to combine. Heat half the oil in a frying pan and when pan is hot, drop potato mixture into pan by large tablespoonsful. Turn heat down slightly. When upper side of latke changes from pink to gray, bottom side is done. Turn and fry until browned on both sides. Add more oil as required.

How to drain your potatoes:

Grate the potatoes and squeeze the water out of them with your hands reserving the squeezed water. Let the water/ starch solution set few minutes, drain the water and add starch to grated potato mix.
